Science/Hipps: Catch A Wave

We are definitely riding that wave. I can see that student understanding and confidence regarding waves is beginning to grow. Today we began sound and will focus on sound next week. It is interesting that sound travels faster in solids, then liquids, then gasses. That is not intuitive to our experiences, but it is true. Besides sound we will continually look back at wave interactions.

When waves interact with other waves interference happens. The energy of both waves can combine to form a larger wave (constructive interference) or they can cancel each other out (destructive interference). When waves interact with medium there are five interactions students must know: transmission, absorption,

reflection, refraction, and diffraction. The last two are the most difficult to understand, but we are well on our way.
