Dump and Clump

- Cut vocabulary cards into individual pieces
- Students are asked to DISCUSS in groups of 3-4 students the relationships between words
- Students should group words into 4-5 different categories based on similar factors or characteristics
- Students should title each category **creatively**
 - This does not work if categories are basic like "people" or "places"
 - Students should be encouraged to have deep dialogue about the words to really consider how they overlap and relate
 - <u>Example</u>: Rosetta Stone, Hieroglyphic, and Papyrus could be in a category called *Language/Communication* as all of those items can be used in communication

the golden age of the civilization of Ancient Egypt; it was a time of wealth, prosperity, and power that lasted from 1520 BC to 1075 BC
